### Structure, Governance and Management

### **Governing Document**

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Unitary Deed of Constitution. Under this structure, the single body of the Kirk Session with its constituent committees oversees both civil and ecclesiastical issues which include everything from property to pastoral care and from finance to vision for the future.

### **Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees**

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees together with the Locum Minister. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the congregation who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The Interim Moderator, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is appointed by the Presbytery.

### **Organisational Structure**

The Kirk Session, chaired by the Interim Moderator and scheduled to meet eight times per annum, is responsible for spiritual affairs within the Church and, under the Unitary Deed of Constitution, also carries responsibility for temporal matters. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the Session Clerk, to the Treasurer and to the Property Convenor as appropriate. The parent charity is the Church of Scotland, charity reference SC011353.

# **Objectives and Activities**

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national church it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It cooperates with other churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond to promote the advancement of religion.

Services are normally held each Sunday at 11.00am. During the service there is a creche available and older children leave for Sunday School after the all-age hymn.

The congregation supports a thriving Boys' Brigade Company and has links with the Girls' Brigade Company now based at Larbert Baptist Church. It has good relations with Brownies, Guides and Scouts.

The church is associated with the Larbert Men's Christian Association and also with the ministry of the Larbert Churches Youth Trust in the High School and its associated Primary schools.

#### **Achievements and Performance**

Our ministry was led throughout the year by our Locum Minister Iain Scoular, a Reader in the Church of Scotland and an Elder at Larbert Old. The Kirk Session was chaired by our Interim Moderator Walter Williamson.

2022 has seen our church getting back to normal services after the Covid pandemic and the associated restrictions. We now regularly have circa 50 people in our congregation each Sunday and have welcomed some newcomers to our congregation. Our Sunday services are broadcast via YouTube so that members who are unable to attend church in person can still feel part of our congregation. The Kirk Session started the year by meeting over Zoom but was able to recommence face to face meetings from February onwards. We were able to re-instate after-service teas and coffee in our halls from Easter. We held an evening vigil for the people of Ukraine on 7<sup>th</sup> March and raised £150 which was sent to 121 George Street for the Faith Impact Forum. Our Locum Minister then journeyed to Poland in April with the charity Home from Home, taking donations for Ukraine which were collected locally including by our own congregation.

We held our Bicentenary Service of Celebration on 20<sup>th</sup> March, delayed from 2021 due to Covid. The service was conducted by the Very Reverend Dr John Chalmers and Iain Scoular. It was very well attended with the Lord Lieutenant of Falkirk and Stirling and the Provost of Falkirk Council in attendance. We raised £367 for Ukraine. We held a joint communion at Larbert Old on 2<sup>nd</sup> October with Larbert East and Larbert West churches which was enjoyed by all and attended a further joint communion at Larbert West church on 11<sup>th</sup> December.

Following publication of our Bicentenary History book in December 2020, A Brief History of the Organ, Organist and Choir of Larbert Old Church was produced and published in February; the details were based on a paper by Mr Robin Bell, organist at Stenhouse & Carron Church, which he prepared for a meeting of the Stirlingshire and District Society of Organists at Larbert Old.

The Presbytery of Forth Valley and Clydesdale came into being during the year and our Kirk Session has had full and regular engagement with the Mission Planning process which seeks to establish a Mission Plan for the Larbert area. At the time of writing the Plan is not finalised.

#### **Financial Review**

The accounts are prepared on a receipts and payments basis. The principal source of income is freewill offerings from Church members. The giving in 2022 amounted to £58,010, 7% lower than last year (2021: £62,668) but which nevertheless demonstrates the congregation's ongoing commitment to our ministry. Rental income for the use of the Church halls by church and community groups totalled £12,946 (2021: £6,476). We have been very successful in attracting a wide range of groups from the Larbert area to use our halls.

Our Ministry and Mission assessment for the cost of ministry, and all local costs, were paid in full and the final two instalments of the £50,000 interest bearing loan from the General Trustees were also paid.

During the year expenditure on fabric and the Restoration Programme was restricted to essential projects only by Presbytery. Our main repairs were for re-leathering the church organ, halls refurbishment, audio equipment and purchasing slates for the hall roof. The necessary re-slating of the main roof of the Church halls was delayed again while Presbytery authorisation was sought.

### Reserves Policy and Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

At the year end the Church held unrestricted cash funds of £110,909 (2021: £79,402) of which £74,643 (2021: £48,643) is designated for the Restoration Fund. £32,758 is held in the General Fund (2021: £27,216).

We continue to assign all rental income from the vacant manse and the Church cottage to the Restoration Programme.

It is the trustees' policy to seek to hold reserves of approximately five months' expenditure which has been achieved. It remains a significant challenge to manage the ongoing Restoration Programme to equip our sanctuary and halls to meet its purpose of ministry and mission to the western end of Larbert and beyond.

The members of the Kirk Session must prepare financial statements which provide sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# **Note 1: Trustee Remuneration and Related Party Transactions**

No other trustee or related party was paid any remuneration. Donations and legacies from trustees totalled £42,458 (2021: £20,040).

# Note 5: Minister's Stipend

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the cost of all ministers' stipends and employer contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale which is related to years of service. For the year under review, the minimum stipend was £28,700 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years) was £35,269.
